CARE for Children's therapeutic recreation programs provide a non-traditional extension of therapy services that aims to give children of all abilities access to fun, recreational activities. Recently, CARE held several programs to engage children who participate in school-based therapy.

On Saturday, March 19th CARE held its 15th annual basketball mini-camp at the Bradford Family YMCA with over 50 children in attendance. The mini-camp was sponsored by the Bradford Rotary Club and the YMCA donated the use of the facility.

"The basketball camp is one of CARE's most anticipated therapeutic recreation programs each year," said Ashley Carlson, CARE pediatric therapy services director. "Participants learn about the game in an inclusive environment and have fun with their friends."

RAINBOW CORNER PRESCHOOL CELEBRATES WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD

The week of April 10th through April 16th was the national celebration of the “Week of the Young Child”. CARE for Children’s Early Learning program hosted several activities to mark the occasion, and promote early learning and family engagement.

Rainbow Corner Preschool hosted a “Make It and Take It” STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) program on Thursday evening for preschoolers and their families. Students participated in hands-on activities, including planting seeds and other activities focused on the environment.

Activity packets with materials for various STEM projects were prepared for students and their families to complete at home. A pizza party finished the evening. The program was made possible through CARE’s partnership with the Bradford Area School District and an Early Childhood Education Innovation Zone grant as part of Pennsylvania’s federally-funded Race to the Top-Early Learning Challenge Grant.

Students participated in several other fun and educational activities during the week. Musical guest and guitarist Jim Ronan visited Rainbow Corner to play beach songs. Members of the Bradford Kiwanis Club; Randy Durner, Reverend Stacey Fussell, and Bob Jarrett, helped preschoolers prepare English muffin pizzas for a snack.

Preschoolers also participated in the tenth annual Pennsylvania One Book, Every Young Child program, which focuses on the importance of early literacy development in preschoolers. CARE board members Mick Marshall and Anne Hardy visited Rainbow Corner to read *Kite Day: A Bear and Mole Story*, by Will Hillenbrand, the 2016 PA One Book selection. Each child received a copy of the book to take home and share with their family.

Other highpoints from the week included specially designed lessons centered on the week’s beach theme and included a beach day, silly sock day, favorite t-shirt day, and pajama day.

INCLUSION IN EARLY LEARNING: TEACHING KINDNESS IN THE CLASSROOM

CARE for Children’s Early Learning Program has long been a model for inclusion. As the first inclusive program in the county over 50 years ago, Rainbow Corner Preschool has high expectations for every child who attends the program to reach his or her potential.

“At CARE we have worked hard to have not just an ‘inclusive’ program but to have a high quality program with inclusion as its foundation,” said Tina Martin, executive director.

The benefits of an inclusive early learning classroom are well documented- both for children with disabilities and typical children- including improved opportunities for development and learning; increased confidence and self-esteem with a better understanding of diversity; and a sense of belonging to a larger community.

“In addition to an established system of supports, our program wants to promote the idea that inclusion increases understanding and acceptance; that the roots of compassion are in every child and an inclusive classroom trains kids for kindness,” added Martin.

“Children are exposed to many things every day in which compassion should be the appropriate response. Sharing, love, respect, generosity and charity are all traits associated with compassion,” according to Preschool Director, Kimberly Engstrom. “Being part of a family, a good friend, a citizen, and a student are all things that should be rooted in compassion for others and the world around us.”

Preschool is a great training ground to reinforce lessons in compassion and kindness that are begun at home. Teaching compassion should be an ongoing process and in today’s world seems even more necessary and important.

KIDS RULE at KIDS' FEST 2016

The fourth annual Kids' Fest was held on Saturday, April 30th at the Bradford Family YMCA. The free community event was geared for children birth to five and their families and over 600 children and family members were in attendance.

Kids' Fest featured kid-friendly entertainment, access to the YMCA Adventure Center, fun, and family resources including child development and safety information and items.

Over 75 organizations sponsored hands-on activities and giveaways for the children in attendance including story books, coloring and activity books, and small games and toys.

CARE hosted a STEM early learning table, where children made their own sensory bottles. Support for the activity was provided by CARE's partnership with the Bradford Area School District and an Early Childhood Education Innovation Zone grant as part of Pennsylvania's federally-funded Race to the Top-Early Learning Challenge Grant.

In addition, CARE had a safety display which featured carbon monoxide and fire safety. Over 35 carbon monoxide detectors were distributed to families during Kids' Fest.

Early learning and early intervention professionals, including CARE staff, were on hand to do developmental screenings which focused on fine and gross motor skills, speech, vision, hearing and a dental wellness evaluation. These screenings not only gave parents awareness of their children's developmental progress but also identified services and supports if needed.

Kids' Fest was hosted by the Bradford YMCA and planned and coordinated by a committee comprised of members of the McKean County Collaborative Board including CARE's Executive Director, Tina Martin and Development & Marketing Coordinator, Leslie Kallenborn.

CARE CONDUCTS SCREENINGS & PROMOTES FAMILY ENGAGEMENT at KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

This spring CARE teachers and therapists partnered with Bradford Area School District and Port Allegany Area School District to help provide developmental screenings for children who will be starting Kindergarten in the fall.

Screenings help identify children who have fine or gross motor delays or challenges. CARE staff were able to make suggestions for summer activities and are also able to track the students' progress once they enter Kindergarten.

With CARE's partnership with the Bradford Area School District and an Early Childhood Education Innovation Zone grant as part of Pennsylvania's federally-funded Race to the Top-Early Learning Challenge Grant, families were given Kindergarten Readiness Packs with activities to do over the summer to help their child prepare for school. The aim of the packs is to promote family engagement.
