In January 2022, CARE welcomed a new slate of officers: Tyler R. Hannah, President; Anne M. Hardy, Vice President; Joseph Yaros, Treasurer; and Thomas E. Ball, Secretary.

During fiscal year 2021-2022, the board and leadership staff worked to update the strategic plan and focus on action items to ensure over-arching organizational goals are met or progressing. The board also adopted a strategic agenda for board meetings to allow more time to discuss big issues and questions as CARE moves into the future.

In June, the organization hosted a Board and Staff Appreciation Luncheon that recognized former board member Jim Macfarlane with the Community CARE Volunteer Award. Staff were recognized for Years of Service. Long-time Physical Therapist, Ann Kane, PT, who retired in June was celebrated and honored for a remarkable career providing school-based and Early Intervention Services.

Norm Strotman was recognized for the achievements during his four-year tenure as board president (2017-2021) including, the continued Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) Investment in the Preschool Program which helps to keep tuition affordable for working families; the expansion of existing therapy programs and the addition of staff to meet capacity; CARE taking over leadership of the McKean County Cribs for Kids Program; the adoption of a Sustainability Plan which is updated annually by the board; the 5<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Ashley Booth Griffin CARE for Children Center, which also marked the payoff of the mortgage; and for providing outstanding leadership as the organization, our communities and our country weathered a Pandemic.

There are some new faces at CARE for Children. At the beginning of the fiscal year, CARE hired a Speech-Language Pathologist, Janel Weber, M.S., CCC-SLP to provide services in Potter and Eastern McKean County, and the caseload grew steadily over the course of the year. Two new therapists were hired in June, Cheyanne France, PT, DPT, who will take over Kane's caseload and Morgan Zaffino, M.S., CF-SLP, who will primarily provide Speech-Language Services in Warren County.

In June 2022, CARE completed its 4th application for renewal for the Pennsylvania Association of Non-profit Organizations (PANO) Standards for Excellence Accreditation; the application will enter the peer review process in 2022-2023.

As CARE finished the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the organization finds itself renewed and ready to move forward after some challenging times. We firmly believe that it is through the connections with our many donors, funders, sponsors, and volunteers who invest so readily and generously in support of CARE's mission that we have not just survived but thrived. Thank you to the board for their generosity and the grace with which they lead the organization and to the compassionate, professional and dedicated staff at CARE for Children, thank you for working so hard to build connections and 'improve the lives of children of all abilities.'

# Building Connections

## Pediatric Therapy

### School-Based Therapy Services

School-based therapy provides children with disabilities and delays improved access to education and helps each child reach their educational potential. CARE for Children contracts with school districts in McKean and Potter Counties to provide school-based Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Speech-Language Services. School-based therapy services support students so they can better access school.

The role of the Physical Therapist (PT), the Occupational Therapist (OT), the Occupational Therapy Assistant (COTA) and Speech and Language Pathologist (SLP) is to integrate therapeutic strategies and interventions that coordinate with the student's curriculum, rather than providing related services as a "special subject" during the school day. Therapy services provide support and adaptations to allow function in school. School-based therapy services are not curative or rehabilitative in nature.

Depending on individual needs, a student may only require services for a specific duration. As the student's ability to participate in the school environment improves and challenges are overcome, the team will determine if services should be less frequent, consultative or discontinued.

CARE promotes a strong partnership between educators, therapists, and families so that the student who experiences challenges in school because of a disability, delay, or injury has the best outcomes.

School-based Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Speech-Language Services are three of the core services CARE for Children provides in our efforts to "improve the lives of children of all abilities".

### Early Intervention, Birth to Three

Physical Therapists, Occupational Therapists, Speech-Language Pathologists, and Special Instructors provide treatment for infants and toddlers who have been identified with developmental delays. Therapy is provided in the child's natural environment using a coaching model to encourage parent/caregiver participation in treatment.

CARE also has a Social Worker on staff who may assist families by providing emotional support, identifying and coordinating community resources, and/or offering parent education, counseling and crisis intervention.

Early Intervention is a collaboration of services which assist and empower families in improving their young child's development. Referrals are made by pediatricians, other health care providers or parents/caregivers to the county Early Intervention system who then refer the child for evaluation and treatment.

Early Intervention is an important safety net for our most vulnerable population. CARE therapists and teachers work with families to ensure children reach appropriate milestones and possibly prevent the need for future intervention.

## Early Learning

### Rainbow Corner Preschool

CARE for Children's Rainbow Corner Preschool provides outstanding early learning experiences for children three to five years of age.

Rainbow Corner fosters an environment to meet each student's developmental and early learning needs. The learning centers in each classroom are equipped with appropriate materials to support the curriculum. The preschool's setting is designed to enhance each child's physical, social, emotional and cognitive development. CARE also has developmentalists on staff to help address specific developmental delays.

The preschool is licensed by the Pennsylvania Department of Education and follows a curriculum that is aligned with Pennsylvania Early Learning Standards. Scholarships and tuition assistance are available for qualified families.

### Toddler Playgroup

The Toddler Playgroup focuses on the unique developmental needs of children ages 24-42 months. Focusing on language, the playgroup helps children enhance and acquire skills by providing a language-rich environment.

Social and sensory skills are promoted through structured play while focusing on manners and self-help skills. Playgroup focuses on activities that encompass one or more of the five senses and how toddlers can better explore the environment around them.

## Developmental Screenings

Therapy and early learning staff provide developmental screenings in various community settings. Developmental screenings look for and monitor signs that a young child may be delayed in one or more areas of development.

Physical therapists conduct scoliosis screenings at middle school. School-based therapists screen students who are identified by school staff to determine if adaptations are needed or if a formal evaluation is needed for services; and therapists also attend Kindergarten Registration to screen incoming students.

Therapists may attend community events which screen children age birth to five for developmental delays. Delays or deficits screened for may include gross or fine motor skills, language/communication, social-emotional, and cognitive functioning.

## Community Outreach

To promote positive child development and in recognition of the sometimes unique challenges presented when raising a child with special health care needs, CARE aims to provide positive supports through community outreach and education, parent engagement and family support.

Social work is at the heart of family support services where participating families join in decision-making and goal setting for their child; and staff engage families to provide supports, to empower families and to help them better advocate.

In addition to social work and family support, other services include transition and inclusion resources, family coaching in the Early Intervention setting; providing information, referrals and connections to community resources; programs to help parents enhance their young child's development; participation in community events; and the sponsorship of parent education and professional workshops on a variety of topics.

Disability Awareness is part of CARE's outreach efforts. The program aims to promote acceptance for children with physical and developmental disabilities. CARE conducts presentations upon request for schools in McKean and Potter Counties, as well as presentations for civic and professional groups.

## Therapeutic Recreation

Therapeutic recreation for children with delays and disabilities provides many benefits including; cardiovascular fitness and improved strength, balance, coordination and muscle control. Programs may also focus on fine motor activities, like arts and crafts. Studies show recreation for children improves self-esteem, provides an opportunity to gain socialization skills and promotes skills and movement.

Therapeutic recreation activities have included: Softball Clinics; Basketball Camp; Adaptive Skiing; Build-a-Friend; Cookie and Bingo Night; Mini Golf; Bowling; Swimming, and other center and community-based activities.

In addition to traditional recreation programs, CARE therapists assist the physical education teachers from the Bradford Area School District in conducting weekly adaptive gym classes for children who might need additional help. The goal of these classes is to promote life-long fitness and the positive self-esteem of students.

**Kindergarten Bicycle Safety**

CARE for Children is the lead agency for the Safe Kids McKean County Partnership with Safe Kids Pennsylvania. Safe Kids McKean is guided by an advisory committee comprised of representatives from local and state organizations, and volunteers; and child safety and injury prevention programs and initiatives are supported by Safe Kids Pennsylvania, United Way funding, donations, sponsorships, grants and CARE for Children Trust Income.

### **MCKEAN COUNTY CRIBS FOR KIDS®**

McKean County Cribs for Kids® partners with Cribs for Kids®, a National Infant Safe-Sleep Initiative, to promote local infant safe sleep education and items. The program provides families a Cribette portable crib or Pack 'n Play® if they cannot otherwise afford safe-sleeping environments for their infants. CARE has trained Safe Sleep Educators on staff who provide parent education and training on proper sleep position and sleep environment.



### **CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY (CPS)**

Safe Kids works closely with volunteer, certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians, the Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics Traffic Injury Prevention Project (TIPP) and other organizations to properly fit car seats and provide replacement seats if needed. The program requires that a certified car seat technician fit and install the seat in the vehicle, and the car seat needs to be the child's primary seat.

### **HOME SAFETY & PARENT RESOURCES**

The McKean County Partnership works with at-home visitors to bring necessary home safety items/childproofing items to families in need. Safe Kids distributes various items such as universal gun locks, door knob covers, cupboard locks and latches, outlet covers, appliance locks, toilet seat locks, furniture straps, smoke detectors, and carbon monoxide detectors. The McKean County Family Centers, Parents as Teachers Program, and Early Intervention providers are active partners, providing family referrals. Families are also able to request items.

### **MCKEAN COUNTY KINDERGARTEN BICYCLE SAFETY**

The McKean County Partnership has an ongoing effort which supports bicycle safety and helmet use initiatives for Kindergarten students across McKean County. CARE staff, along with community volunteers, conduct a bicycle safety program and fit and distribute helmets for students and fit helmets for other age groups by request.

### **COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT**

Throughout the year, representatives from the Safe Kids Partnership, CARE staff and child safety partners participate in various community-wide initiatives and events to promote child safety and injury prevention efforts. The partnership also provides training on various child safety-related topics to organizations and community groups.



# Program Spotlight- Early Intervention

## Fiscal Year 2021-2022

### Developmental Screenings Help Babies Stay on Track

CARE for Children partners with the McKean County Child Find Committee, which is represented by members from McKean County Department of Human Services, Early Intervention Service Coordination, and other Early Intervention providers, who work together to promote the early identification of delays in babies and toddlers and provide the subsequent assessment and treatment to ensure the best outcomes for participating children as they grow.

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, “as many as one in four children are at risk for developmental delay, and universal early childhood screening provides an opportunity to identify delays early and intervene during the most critical period of development.”

“Early Intervention services focus on skills that babies and toddlers typically develop during the first three years of life. We can assist children who are not meeting their milestones due to a delay in one or more areas of development including cognition, motor, social-emotional, self-help, or communication,” said Cindy Wright, lead service coordinator for the McKean County Infant/Toddler Early Intervention Program.

Developmental screenings are an important component in identifying children who may need services and also provide a snapshot of a child’s development. Pediatrician’s offices provide developmental monitoring by asking parents questions about their child’s development. A missed milestone may signal a problem, triggering a more in-depth evaluation and possibly a referral to Early Intervention. Screenings and more formal evaluations are an extension of that monitoring and provide an additional safety net for families.

In certain instances, screenings become imperative. According to the Center for Disease Control, “If a child is at higher risk for developmental problems due to preterm birth, low birthweight, environmental risks like lead exposure, or other factors, the child’s healthcare provider may also discuss additional screenings. If a child has an existing long-lasting health problem or a diagnosed condition, the child should have developmental monitoring and screening in all areas of development, just like those without special healthcare needs.”

“If families with young children have concerns, parents can call and request a screening. The good news: most families find out that their child is right on track developmentally,” according to Wright. “If the family has a concern or one is found during the screening, it can be addressed immediately. Early Intervention has a network of pediatric specialists, including physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists, special instructors and social workers.”

“It is an integral part of CARE for Children’s mission of improving the lives of children of all abilities to continue to raise awareness of the importance of providing opportunities for children to experience the type of early environment - at home, at child care, at school - that will promote critical early learning and positive development,” added Ashley Carlson, MOT, OTR/L, Pediatric Therapy Services Coordinator at CARE.

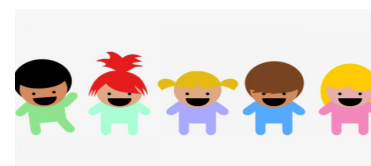

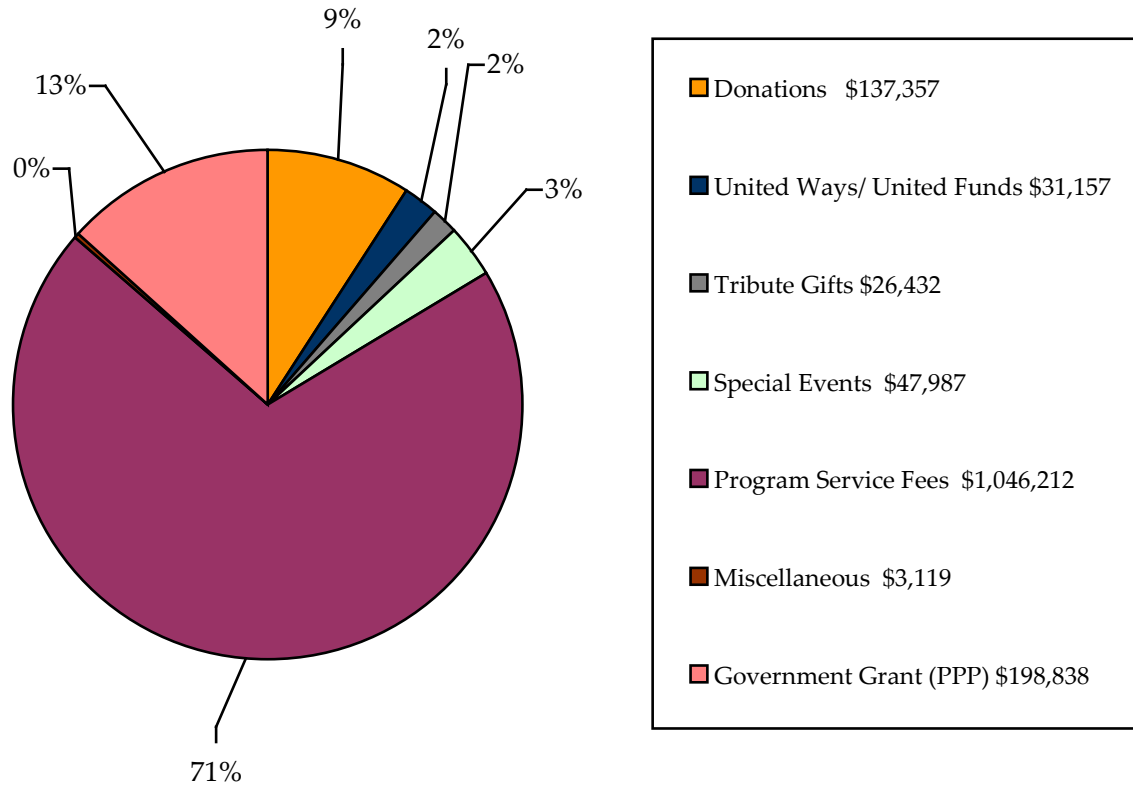

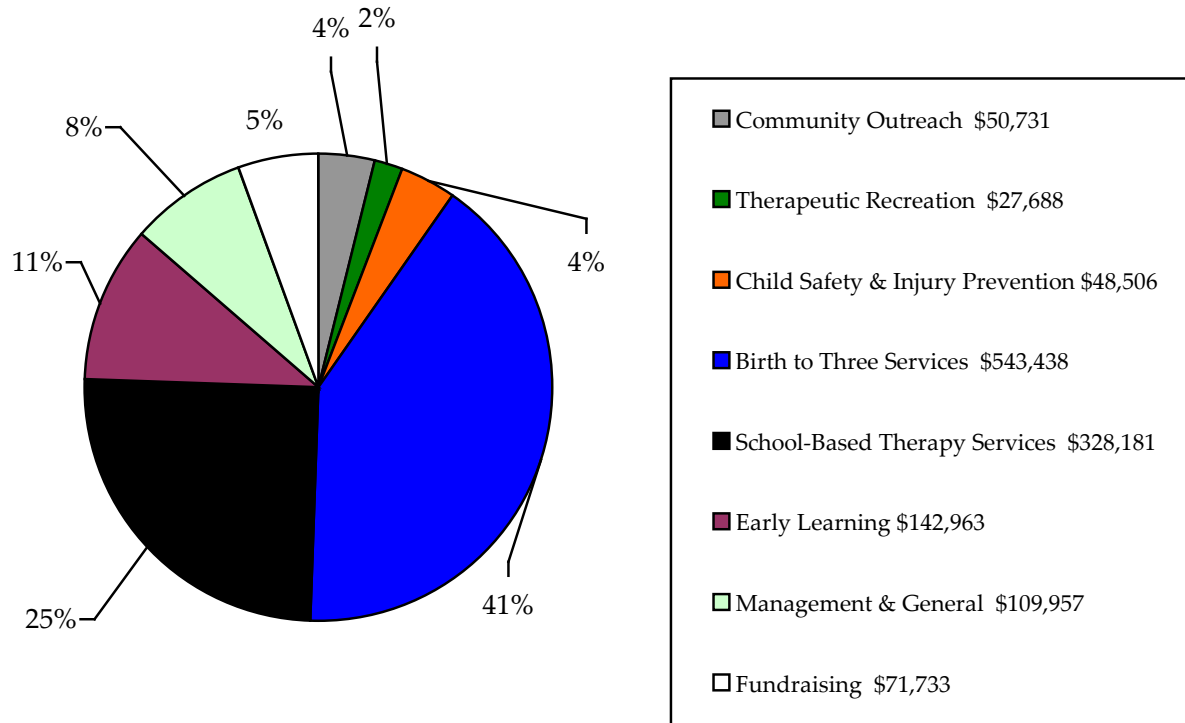
