## **SUMMER RECREATION and LEARNING for CARE KIDS**

CARE for Children offered a variety of programs which focused on therapeutic recreation and early learning throughout the summer months.

CARE's Summer Day Camp for school-age children provided fun, therapeutic programming throughout four weekly sessions during the month of June at the University of Pittsburgh at Bradford. Campers did arts and crafts, storytime, gym activities, nature walks on the Pitt Trail, and swimming.

"Summer Day Camp reinforces school-based therapy skills that students work on throughout the school year. CARE staff have the opportunity to continue helping participants work on both fine motor and gross motor skills in a fun, informal setting," said Ashley Carlson, MOT, OTR/L, CARE Pediatric Therapy Services Director.

Campers also enjoyed two field trips as part of CARE's summer therapeutic recreation programming to wrap up the summer. An adaptive golf outing was held at Pine Acres Country Club on August 9th, 2017 and bowling at Good Times of Olean was held on August 16th, 2017. *Continued on page 3*

## **ANNUAL GOLF TOURNEY RAISES \$22,680**

The 24th annual CARE 'fore' Children Golf Tournament was held on Sunday, August 6th, 2017 at Pine Acres Country Club. The event raised \$22,680 to support CARE's free community outreach services for children with disabilities; pediatric developmental and preventative screenings; therapeutic recreation programs; child safety initiatives that aim to prevent disabilities and fatalities from accidental injuries; and inclusive early learning programs.

Premier and Lead Sponsors, Allegheny Bradford Family of Companies, Philo & Sarah Blaisdell Foundation, Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield, and Zippo/Case Museum, presented this year's tournament. CNB Bank, Marshall Insurance Services, and Kids & Cancer Benefit were flight sponsors. In total, over 140 donors, businesses and organizations provided sponsorships and in-kind donations of prizes and other services to support the tournament. Thirty teams comprised of 120 golfers made up the field.

The board approved the vision at the June 2017 Board Meeting.

CARE is grateful for the support of the University of Pittsburgh at Bradford, Good Times of Olean, Pine Acres Country Club and Kirk Stauffer, PGA Pro, who helped provide wonderful activities during sessions of Summer Day Camp.

Funding is generously provided from the United Way of the Bradford Area, Inc. and the Orak Grotto for staffing, materials and supplies, and special activities for camp; and CARE appreciates Todd Busses for providing transportation to the off-site field trips.

CARE's Rainbow Corner Preschool Day Camp, for children 3 to 5 years old, was held during six sessions in June and focused on STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) activities and Early Literacy.

"We had 21 children enrolled in this year's camp and with the focus on STEAM we were able to do activities that were hands on and engaged the students' creativy and curiosity about the world around them," said Kimberly Engstrom, M.Ed., Preschool Director.

"The partnership with the Bradford School District and grant funding has been invaluable by providing a wide variety of learning materials and enabling our staff to be innovative in our approach to adding STEAM activities to the curriculum," added Engstrom.

Preschoolers enjoyed outdoor time and the many lessons that utilized the playground as an outdoor classroom. Special guests included guitarist Jim Ronan and Smokey the Bear.

STEAM activities at both camps were funded in part through CARE's partnership with the Bradford Area School District and an Early Childhood Education Innovation Zone grant as part of Pennsylvania's federally-funded Race to the Top-Early Learning Challenge Grant.

CARE for Children's Best Baby Playgroup is a free, informal program geared for babies, toddlers, and parents and is held the third Wednesday of the month at the Bradford Area Public Library, Early Learning Center at 6:00 p.m.

The playgroup is staffed by CARE teachers and therapists and includes a short activity, a chance for children to play, and an opportunity for families to network.

The program is funded in part by the United Way of the Bradford Area, Inc. and through CARE's partnership with the

funded Race to the Top-Early Learning Challenge Grant.

CARE for Children's Rainbow Corner Preschool is an approved Pre-Kindergarten program through the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program. In 2001, the EITC program overwhelmingly passed the legislature and was signed into law by former Governor Tom Ridge. HB 996, the Educational Improvement Tax Credit, provides companies with a 75% tax credit for donations to a non-profit scholarship or educational improvement organization. The tax credit increases to 90% if the company commits to making the same donations for two consecutive years. A business paying taxes in Pennsylvania can receive up to \$200,000 in tax credits annually. Businesses who are interested in supporting CARE's early learning program and help working families afford a Pre-Kindergarten program, please visit www.careforchildren.info for more information.

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
